

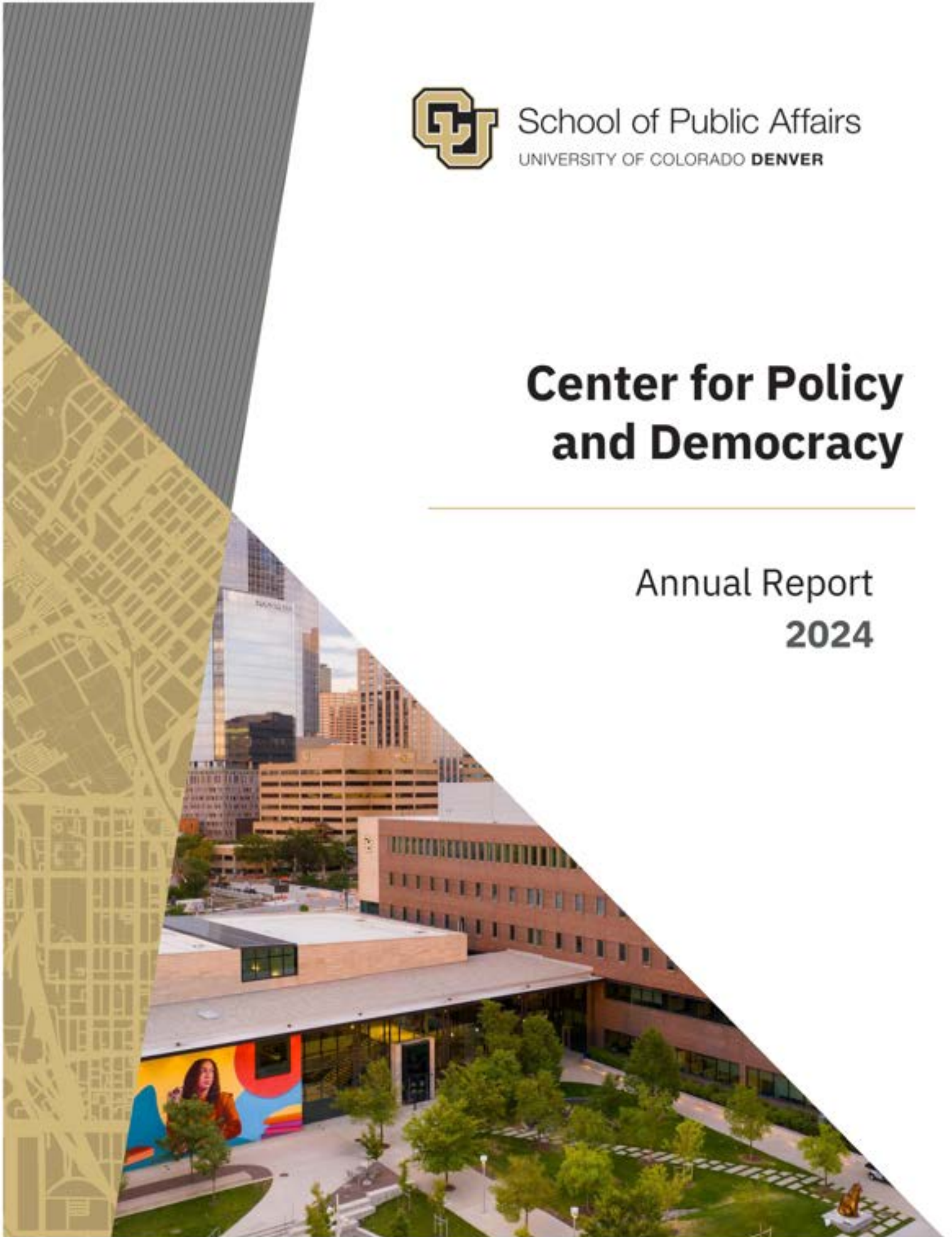

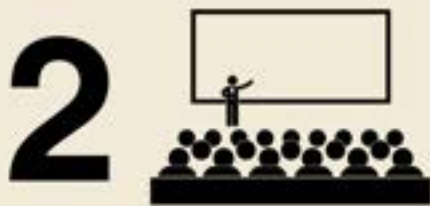

# MPP & POLICY WORKSHOP SEMINAR

The Master of Public Policy (MPP) program combines the analytical features of traditional MPP degrees with the emphasis on democracy and the policy process unique to CU Denver. The Policy Workshop Seminar, facilitated by Tanya Heikkila and Chris Weible, features critical analyses of policy and democracy scholarship, in-depth discussions of student research, exploration of contemporary events, and guest lectures by scholars and practitioners.



## SERVICE HIGHLIGHTS

This year, Tanya Heikkila was appointed to the Board of Trustees for the Colorado Health Institute (CHI). CHI is committed to driving change in three initiative areas: climate and health, behavioral health, and integrating systems of care to better the lives of Coloradans.

CPD continued to support Building Democratic Communities a multi-disciplinary effort that spans more than a dozen academic units and 30 faculty on supporting teaching, research, and community engagement on democratic themes.



Allegra Fullerton has worked alongside Kristin Olofsson of Colorado State University to promote and facilitate the Advocacy Coalition Framework Seminar. This year's presentations included CU Denver's Chris Weible, University of Tennessee's Michael Jones, and Brock University's Tim Heinmiller.



# CONFERENCE ON POLICY PROCESS RESEARCH



The Center for Policy and Democracy is proud to have been a primary sponsor for the second Conference on Policy Process Research (COPPR) hosted at Syracuse University. COPPR brought together nearly 400 policy process researchers, more than half of whom represented institutions outside of the United States, creating a vibrant and diverse setting for policy process scholarship.

The mission of COPPR is to advance policy process scholarship by supporting a wide range of theories and methods while fostering connections among established and emerging research communities. COPPR encourages critical reflection on past lessons, challenges contemporary boundaries, and promotes innovative research agendas for the future. CPD supported the programmatic elements for the event and our team of co-directors, students, and staff all attended and presented our research. This engagement remains a cornerstone of CPD's service to the research community. Together our team shared over 20 papers, five of which Emma Scheetz led!

## FEATURED VISITING SCHOLAR

The CPD, the School of Public Affairs, and CPD's very own Pepe Sánchez hosted Dr. Hank Jenkins-Smith for a dialogue session linking policy processes and policy analysis. Dr. Jenkins-Smith is well known as one of the co-creators of Advocacy Coalition Framework (ACF). This session, moderated by CPD Co-Director Chris Weible, explored questions about the role of policy analysis and science in the policy process, policy change and learning, coalition politics, and more!

## FIRST FRIDAYS

CPD supports SPA's signature First Fridays with the School of Public Affairs event series covers a wide range of pressing issues and features panelists representing a diversity of viewpoints. The events are held in person and virtually most months during the fall and spring semesters.

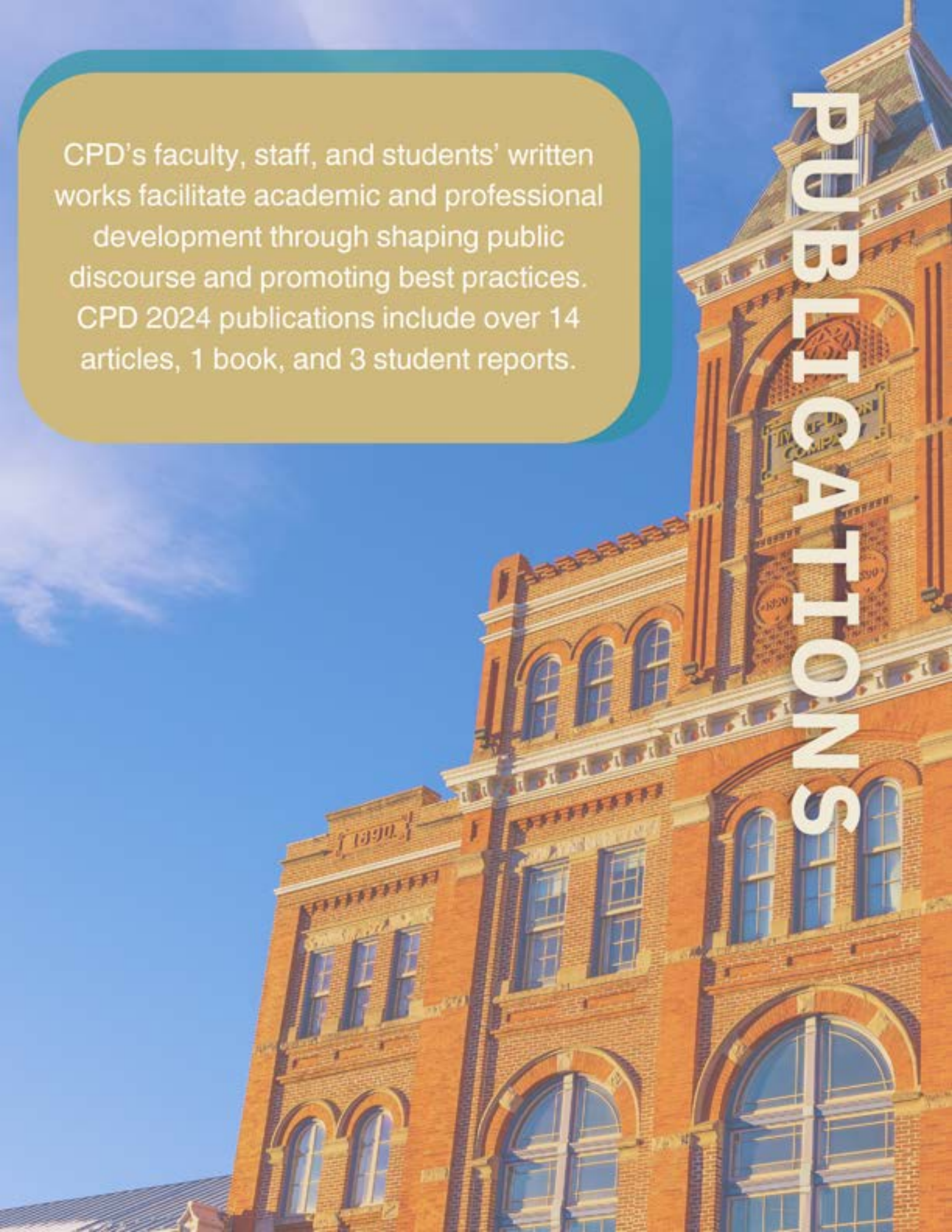

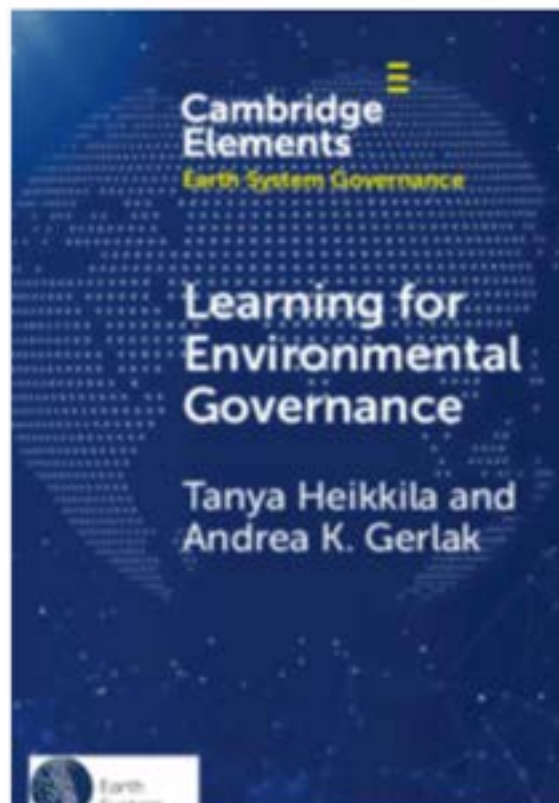

## LEARNING FOR ENVIRONMENTAL GOVERNANCE

TANYA HEIKKILA AND ANDREA GERLAK

Learning is critical for our capacity to govern the environment and adapt proactively to complex and emerging environmental issues. Yet, underlying barriers can challenge our capacity for learning in environmental governance. As a result, we often fail to adequately understand pressing environmental problems or produce innovative and effective solutions. This Element synthesizes insights from extensive academic and applied research on learning around the world to inform both research and practice. We distill the social and structural features of governance to help researchers and practitioners better understand, diagnose, and support learning and more adaptive responses to environmental problems.



# EMOTIONS AND POLITICS

*Examining emotional belief expressions of advocacy coalitions*

**ALLEGRA H. FULLERTON & CHRISTOPHER M. WEIBLE**

Many theories and approaches to policy studies have recently begun to question and research how emotions interact with peoples' understanding and behaviors, especially in policy and politics. This paper builds on and contributes to studying emotions in policy and politics via the advocacy coalition framework (ACF).



*Emotional expressions and Advocacy coalitions*

While many policy process theories mention emotions, they have remained mostly unexplored theoretically and empirically, even as broader social science literature incorporates emotions into understanding policy process-related phenomena such as political beliefs and behaviors. This paper introduces the theoretical arguments and a method for studying advocacy coalitions using a combination of emotions and beliefs within the Advocacy Coalition Framework.

*Exploring emotional discourses: The case of COVID-19 protests in US media*

Emotions are involved in virtually every aspect of human cognition, including information processing and decision-making. Thus, to understand political conflict and policy decision-making more fully, we must strive to understand the role of emotions in these phenomena. This paper explores expressed emotions in protests related to the policy decisions around the COVID-19 pandemic.



*How are emotions and beliefs expressed in legislative testimonies?  
An advocacy coalition approach*

While emotions are an inherent component of the human experience that influence behavior, values, and beliefs, they have largely been left out of policy process studies theoretically and methodologically. Using the Advocacy Coalition Framework (ACF), with its focus on how individuals coalesce into coalitions around a set of common beliefs, we begin to situate emotions as a critical component of belief systems and discourse about public policies. This study analyzes legislative testimony from four policies debated during the 2021 Colorado Legislative Session using discourse analysis to identify the emotions and coalitional beliefs.



*Analyzing emotional discourse among allies and opponents in the news media*

The sociology of emotions reveals how emotion contributes to and helps inform social and political issues. This study contributes to the literature by examining how competing advocacy coalitions ascribe emotions to their allies and opponents in the politically contentious issue of siting a gas pipeline project in the US. It analyses the emotional and belief expressions of people engaged in the debate in approximately 370 newspaper articles.



## LEARNING AND BELIEFS



*The political polarization over abortion:  
An analysis of advocacy coalition belief systems*

Although abortion policy is often discussed as a black-and-white conflict characterized by polarization and a lack of compromise, this study explores the validity of such a presupposition by asking how advocates articulate their belief systems about abortion policy and in what ways—if at all—are those beliefs shared within and across coalitions and create fissures within and between coalitions?

*Illuminating the collective learning continuum in the*

*Colorado River Basin Science-Policy Forums*

Although considerable research over the past two decades has examined collective learning in environmental governance, much of this scholarship has focused on cases where learning occurred, limiting our understanding of the drivers and barriers to learning. To advance knowledge of what we call the “collective learning continuum,” we compare cases of learning to cases where learning was not found to occur or its effects were “blocked.”



*Knowledge is not power: Learning in polycentric governance systems*

The link between knowledge and decision-making in polycentric systems is shaped by the process of collective learning, where policy actors participate in multiple policy forums to acquire, translate, and disseminate knowledge. This article argues that the relationship between learning and participation in polycentric systems differs for actors with executive responsibilities versus specialized staff.

*Diagnosing individual barriers to collective learning:  
How governance contexts shape cognitive biases*

**TANYA HEIKKILA, ANDREA K. GERLAK, & BETSY SMITH**

A growing body of public policy and governance scholars recognize the importance of learning in supporting adaptive and responsive governance systems. Fostering learning within policy processes and governance systems, however, can be challenging. Collectively, we often ignore or misinterpret relevant policy information, or we may be incapable of translating new information into policy. Despite significant scholarly attention to learning, knowledge of the barriers to learning remains underdeveloped. To advance theoretical insights, this article integrates research on individual cognitive biases with literature on learning to identify barriers that can block learning or lead to non-learning in policy and governance processes. It also explores how these barriers can be mitigated or exacerbated by different governance contexts.



*Learning in polycentric governance:*

*Insights from the California Delta science enterprise*

Science is critical for learning and adaptation of policy and governance systems. Increasingly, science is produced in the context of a science enterprise: a complex, polycentric institutional arrangement featuring multiple science forums and actors. The characteristics of these polycentric systems can influence whether and to what extent science supports policy-relevant learning. Limited research, however, has examined how science enterprises function as polycentric systems and how they can be governed to support learning

## TANYA HEIKKILA

*"BUILDING REGIONAL CLIMATE RESILIENCE AND SOCIAL EQUITY THROUGH HOUSING AND LAND USE POLICY"*

This year, Tanya, in collaboration with eight other CU Denver faculty (pictured below), received a \$1.8 million dollar grant from the U.S. National Science Foundation. This grant supports research on two interrelated crises: climate change and housing affordability. These critical challenges are affecting urban communities in the U.S., and transit-oriented communities (TOCs) offer a promising strategy to address both issues. The research will engage in interdisciplinary research to identify and evaluate policies and urban designs that enable climate-resilient and equitable TOCs. The research will also develop tools to help policymakers understand tradeoffs and support transformative capacity for equitable and sustainable growth.



## ANNA CRAWFORD

*"IMPROVING REPRODUCTIVE HEALTH POLICY THROUGH INTERSECTIONAL ADVOCACY"*

This year, Anna received a \$7,500 grant from the Society of Family Planning to support her work. This grant supports ongoing efforts to further Anna's research agenda which focuses on reproductive healthcare policy, intersectionality, and democracy. With this support, Anna can advance current studies on how marginalized communities disproportionately feel the policy effects of abortion regulations and also have an unequal voice in the policy processes that shape regulations.

## SOJEONG KIM, ADAM M. WELLSTEAD, & TANYA HEIKKILA

Each year, the editors of the Review of Policy Research journal award an editors' choice best paper, which honors the contribution of the highest scientific quality and excellence to advance policy research. This year, the award was given to SPA PhD alum, Sojoeng Kim, who worked with Adam Wellstead at Michigan Tech University and Tanya on a study of policy innovation labs (PILs). The publication examined how PILs contribute to policy capacity.

## **CHRIS WEIBLE**



Chris is an internationally recognized public policy scholar and professor who's work has significantly contributed to policy process theories. His most notable work being the Advocacy Coalition Framework explains how change occurs throughout the policy process as it relates to advocacy coalitions and organizations. Chris's contributions to public policy sciences have influenced academic research and real-world policy making. His scholarly work such as the *Theories of the Policy Process*, have been studied in classrooms worldwide and has shaped how they are studied and understood. Through his scholarship and leadership he has been awarded an Honorary Doctorate from the Lulea University in Sweden.

Chris's influence on future generations as a mentor and leader has led to countless students receiving academic positions, making him one of the most impactful mentors at the CU Denver. His dedication has earned him the university's top mentoring awards.

Within the broader academic community, Chris has co-edited leading journals, launched the Conference on Policy Process Research (COPPR), and led initiative such as "Building Democratic Communities" at CU Denver to inspire progress in academic study and practical application of public policy.
